

Community Action Plan – Soho First

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1. Introduction

Soho First developed out of the former Community First Panel – Soho Community First. The Community First programme in Soho Ward helped bring together many groups and organisations active in the area. In the last year of the programme it was decided to explore ways in which this partnership working could be taken forward after the programme finished. A community conference was organised to which groups and organisations were invited to attend – many had been recipients of Community First funding. A second meeting was convened at which the decision was taken to begin forming a Community Development Trust. A vision statement was also agreed together with some initial aims and objectives. The interim body for this Trust is called Soho First and there is a steering group – comprising individual residents, former panel members, and representatives from other groups and organisations active in Soho Ward. *A list of current Soho First interim steering group members is included in appendix 1.1.*

First Steps

The Community Development Foundation's First Steps programme has enabled Soho First to take this process a stage further by providing the opportunity to develop a community action plan. The purpose of the action plan is to determine the initial priorities for the area and the practical actions that will help make a positive difference to the neighbourhoods comprising Birmingham's Soho Ward.

The aim of the plan is to identify issues that the residents of Soho Ward wish to prioritize, through:

- Placing the actions within identifiable themes, whilst recognising that there is some overlap between themes;
- Focusing on some priority actions that will build on strengths and tackle issues that local people feel are most important;
- Identify how these actions might be achieved, including who might be involved and how they might be resourced;
- Identifying other issues, which can be addressed over the longer term.

2. Soho Ward Profile

Soho Ward is a diverse multicultural inner-city area situated on the west side of Birmingham. The area comprises several distinct neighbourhoods: Brookfields, Winson Green and Summerfield, Gibb Heath and Soho Finger, All Saints and Hockley. It is a mixture of residential properties, many dating from the Victorian period, industrial premises, and includes some notable public buildings such as HMP Birmingham Prison and City Hospital.

The ward of Soho has a population of just over 30,000 and a population density of some 63 persons per hectare. The area has a young population with 38% of residents aged 24 years and under. Unemployment is high at 10.2% but has steadily fallen over the past two years.

Educational attainment is lower than the city average with less than 50% qualified to NVQ Level 2 or above.

Levels of deprivation are high in Soho Ward with half the population living in the 5% most deprived neighbourhoods in England. Child poverty is high with 44.1% of children in the ward being defined as being in poverty. This is above the city rate of 37.1% and significantly above the UK rate of 25.1%.

A significant proportion (10.7%) of Soho's population do not speak English well, or at all and 35% were born outside of the EU countries. Ethnic minority groups in the area include Indian, Pakistani, Bangladeshi, Chinese, and African and African Caribbean groups. Of the working age population around 45% are of Asian background and 23% Black.

In some of the schools, class sizes have multiplied and turnover rates of children changing schools have increased.

A high proportion of residents rent their homes from Housing Associations/Registered Social Landlords and private landlords.

The ward is full of small enigmas; take for example, the length of residency. It has a higher than average residency of both less than 2 years and more than 10 years. In fact all of the residency criteria are significantly more in this ward than in England or Birmingham as a whole. The ward is said to have twice as many residents in communal establishments. 'A communal establishment is defined as managed residential accommodation where there is full-time or part-time supervision of the accommodation'. Examples include prisons and hospitals, small hotels and guesthouses, and sheltered housing if less than half the residents possess their own facilities for cooking' (ONS, 2001). Such establishments include Winson Green Prison and its inmate capacity of 1,450 (www.justice.gov.uk), Birmingham and Solihull Mental Health NHS Foundation Trust establishments, Callum Lodge, Mary Seacole house and the Meadowcroft unit in Winson Green; as well as private establishments such as Beeton Lodge (a learning disability care home).

What's special about Soho?

Although there are difficulties and challenges in living in Soho, there are also many things that are special. We have tried to capture these in a "Wordle" based on the responses to the question – What is special about Soho? Proximity to family and friends are especially valued as are the local facilities, including local shops, schools and Children's Centre, library, parks and places of worship. The multicultural nature of the community is also greatly appreciated as are the support networks, neighbourliness and sense of community spirit. Soho is also well placed geographically in terms of the transport links and proximity to the city centre. There are lots of things to be proud of in Soho.



3. Community consultation

3.1 Previous work that has informed this plan

The action plan has been informed by information from several sources involving local residents and representatives from groups and organisations active in Soho Ward.Some of this consultation pre-dates the First Steps programme.

- Results from 39 questionnaires from Love Your Neighbourhood Event held at Summerfield Community Centre (see Appendix 1.2 for copy of questionnaire)
- Two community conferences held in October and November 2014
- A recent study of the Winson Green area by Octavius Learning and Development Partnership: 'A foundation on which to lay the concept of resident participation'

3.2 Recent consultation using the Listening form template

Following attendance at a First Steps training course run by Community Organisers Ltd it was decided to adopt this methodology to gain further insights into the difficulties and challenges that residents face; how in an ideal world they would like the area to be; and any ideas or actions that could be taken to make this ideal possible.

Sixty conversations were had with residents at various settings across the ward using the Listening form template as a guide. (See Appendix 1.3 for copy of the Listening form).

3.3Summary of responses to questionnaires

In answer to the question - What three changes would you make in Soho Ward to make it a better place to live? – amajority of the responses (26) were about the environment. Ideas included the following:

- Cleaner streets
- More litter bins and emptied more often
- Environmental/Street wardens
- Prosecute fly-tipping
- More and better recycling
- Education about the environment

Other changes that residents would like to see included:

- Job opportunities and training (14)
- Community safety and a reduction in crime (14)
- Bringing communities together/more community involvement (9)
- Opportunities for children and young people (13)
- Better transport especially public transport, walking and cycling routes (5)
- More support for families (4)
- More support for seniors (3)

3.4Summary of the responses to conversations using the Listening form template

We focus here on the two questions on the Listening form:

- What are the difficulties about living in Soho?
- In an ideal world, how would Soho be in the future?

Environment again comes out as a key priority. Residents would like to see cleaner streets, less fly tipping, better use of green space, and landlords being held responsible for fly tipping and tenant behaviour.

Again, Community spirit – a more cohesive, friendly and tolerant community - was also a priority together with action on crime and safety, and employment and education e.g. access to ESOL classes and college courses. See appendix 1.4 for a summary of the responses.

3.5The earlier study by Octavius highlighted the following issues:

- The multicultural/multilingual nature of the neighbourhood. This is seen by many as a positive aspect of the area. However, assome people don't speak English as their first language, this can be a barrier to communication between neighbours.
- Waste management is a key concern
- Finding time to commit to community activities and interact with neighbours due to other pressures such as work, family, childcare etc.
- Opportunities for children and young people, including safe places to play outdoors and youth provision.'

3.6 Community Conferences held in 2014

The two community conferences held at Soho House Museum were attended in total by 46 local residents and representatives from local groups and organisations. An effort was made to try and identify five key priorities around which action might be taken. The following is a summary of the group responses:

- Creating a clean and safe environment
- Local economy localism, enterprise support, employment, volunteering, apprenticeships and skills
- Bringing people together including young and old, different cultures, community engagement (especially involving women) and information sharing
- Celebrating culture, heritage and identity raising the profile of Soho Ward
- Activities and facilities for children and young people
- Health and well-being

3.7 Stakeholder mapping

In parallel to the development of the draft action plan we have been putting together a database of the individuals, groups and organisations in the area so that we can consult with them on the draft action plan.

4. Vision Statement

"Soho will be a vibrant community that both aspires and inspires, making the most of its assets. A community that provides opportunities to succeed; is respectful of other cultures; and gives people a voice!

A place where people choose to live because it is an attractive, safe and clean environment, with sustainable neighbourhoods. Somewhere with leisure facilities and employment opportunities for young and old.

To bring out the best and showcase the cultural diversity of the area. To inspire the community to invest in the community through time, enterprise and shared values."

5. Priorities

The responses of the 162 people who participated in interviews or events detailed earlier highlighted a number of key priorities within Soho ward which over time Soho First would like to address. We have chosen to start with two – Environment and Bringing people together (Community Cohesion) – as these are areas which we feel are within our circle of influence, and where with limited resources we can make a difference within a reasonable timescale. Draft action plans for these two themes were developed and submitted to CDF as part of the First Steps programme for evaluation and comment. The draft action plans for each theme were then used as a starting point for further consultation at an event organised at Soho House Museum on Thursday 11th February 2016 with a view to inviting feedback and developing more detailed action plans.

Why?	Environment consistently appears on the list of priorities for the area as identified by local residents in conversations, questionnaires and at events, including public meetings. The environment has an impact on how people perceive the area and in particular on how safe residents feel on the streets. It can also have a direct impact on public health through encouraging rats and other vermin. Action to tackle waste and litter can help bring people together and help restore pride and respect.

6. Action Plans

The community conference on 11th February at Soho House Museum was attended by 38 participants (*Please see appendix1.5 for a list of those attending*). After an introduction to set the scene, the participants divided into two workshops looking at the action plans for Environment and Bringing People Together (Community Cohesion). This was followed by a feedback session where people could share the key outcomes from their discussions. Some photographs and comments from the event are included – *please see appendix 1.6*.

7. Delivery

Taking the plan forward

The plan is a working document and is intended as a starting point for further discussions about how to make the actions happen – who will take the lead on individual actions; who else needs to be involved; what resources are available, orrequired.

In order to implement the two action plans we will need to establish task groups. The role of the task groups will be to:

- Raise awareness about the plan
- Recruit others to be actively involved
- Work to make actions happen either directly or by encouraging others
- Monitor progress
- Review the plan and update it
- Continue to engage with the community

Actions

The desired outcomes in the action plans for each theme are listed in order of priority. We have included some of potential partners, but we recognise that we still need to secure the commitment of other partners who will be important in achieving the desired outcomes. Where possible, timescales have been identified. Further work will be required to secure the resources required for some of the action points. We have also suggested ways in which the actions can be evaluated or monitored.
